"At that hour of the night the jailer took them and washed their wounds; then immediately he and his family were baptized." - Acts 16:33

What an amazing story we find in the Philippian jail. The miracle of the earthquake and the open doors is only a small part of the work that God was doing. The larger miracle involved the changed lives of those who believed that night. The same source of water that the jailer offered for the washing of the evangelists' wounds proved worthy for his baptism once he had believed. And the Scripture records that "he was filled with joy because he had come to believe in God – he and his whole family" (Acts 16:34b).

This story reminds me of the "one the way" stories: the ten lepers who were healed *on the way* to show themselves to the priests; the disciples who met the risen Jesus *on the way* to Emmaus. In this story, the Philippian jailer who experienced a miracle at the jail immediately began to care for Paul and Silas, and, *on the way*, he and his whole house discovered the love and mercy of God.

Most of our lives are spent on the way to somewhere else. We often think our starting points and destinations are the important places, but we find that the journey is the place where we encounter God. It often isn't when we've arrived safely and have unpacked and are getting comfortable that God intervenes in our lives. Instead, it's when a Samaritan encounters a wounded traveler beside the road, or when a man named Simon visits Jerusalem and finds himself forced to carry a cross to Golgotha, or when a man named Saul is on the road to Damascus, that God chooses to enter lives and change them forever.

It shouldn't surprise us that God uses times like these to enter our lives. They are probably the times when we're not in control, times when God can show us that he can be trusted to order our lives in ways we never expected. They are probably times when we don't want to be interrupted, but times when God wants us to see that our lives will never suffer from the imprint of His will.

I've never cared much for interruptions. I like getting things done on my own schedule. Too often, I throw up a quick prayer requesting God's blessing on an itinerary I never submitted for His approval. As a result, my plans often require interruptions when God lovingly intervenes, reenters my life, and reminds me of His love.

I recommend these heavenly interruptions to you. Upon immediate consideration, they become but one more task in a long line of things to do. But as we begin to see them for what they are, they become recognizable opportunities for growth and conversion. In retrospect, they are the moments when we feel closest to God and to others. Learn to recognize them for what they are – miracles of God's grace when He shares a little more of Himself with us *on the way*.

Prayer: Help me, Father, to give myself to you continually, especially when my busyness would keep me separated from you and from others. Amen.

Few of us remember those Sundays that come the week after Easter. By then the pastel finery is packed away in our closets. The lunch is not as great. The anticipation for corporate worship has dropped down from the seasonal high we felt just a week before. There is less excitement, less panache, less décor — *and more resemblance to that original Easter so many Sundays ago*.

It's easy to forget that the Easter morning of A.D. 33 didn't come with big hats and bowties. Those disciples huddled together in fear, not faith. They tended their wounds, not flaunted their tidiness. And then — *then* — they worshiped Jesus.

They worshiped Jesus not because of what they had to offer, but because *he* bombarded their worlds with hope. He exploded the walls of their wretchedness with the irrefutable fact that the grave had not won, that death had been defeated, that the guilt and power of sin had been slain. They were astonished, at best; despairing, at worst; helpless, in the least — and Jesus walked in with his life-changing peace.


Jesus stepped into their space in the same way he steps into ours by his Spirit — as the resurrected Christ, the reigning King, the Lord of all. He comes as the one who is not served by human hands as though he needed anything, but who gives to all mankind life and breath and everything. He comes as the one whose glory is not contrived by our praise, but whose glory compels our praise — even today, even on this "normal" Sunday.

Or, perhaps, he compels our praise *especially* on this normal Sunday because we're reminded that worship is not about us bringing our best, but about finding him as better. We come to him who first came to us. And we come not to give, but to receive. We come as those who need to hear his voice, feel his nearness, know his love.

We come to get God, to say together, humbly and gladly in the Spirit's power, with the heart of Psalm 116:12-13: *"What shall we render the Lord Jesus for all his resurrec-*

tion benefits? We will lift up the cup of salvation and call upon his name."

Worship Ministry Give Us Each Day Our Daily Bread

The Gospel of Luke the 11th chapter tells us that Jesus was praying in a certain place and after He finished one His disciples said to Him, "Lord, teach us to pray as John taught his disciples." This was the only occasion in which any of the disciples ask Jesus to teach them something. And He said to them, "When you pray say (looking specially at the fourth petition of the Lord's Prayer), 'Give us each day our daily bread'." This addresses how we are sustained daily by the gift of our daily bread from the Father whether we pray and ask Him. He provides us with it whether we are believers or unbelievers, whether we are good or evil. There is no discrimination. This petition speaks of our utter dependence upon God. Our physical necessities are all supplied by the Father, day by day. It shows us that our basic needs come from God. We live in daily dependence upon the Father, acknowledging Him as the source of every good. Yet many of us assume that our daily bread is something to be taken for granted, never thinking about the provider. Many of us have no perceptions of why or how our daily bread comes to us. Do we know what is implicated or how it applies to one's daily life?

Luther interpreted "daily bread" to includes the full range of the necessities for bodily life in this world, as well as God's provisions that grant spiritual life now and eternal life in the age to come. Luther saw "daily bread" as encompassing all of God's gifts, spiritual as well as physical. Nevertheless, we live our lives at such a fast pace that we often forget to thank God for our daily bread. What can we give ourselves that is not provided by the Father through our daily bread? Many of us never think about physical needs because the things we need are there for us each day unless someone or something changes them. We take for granted that our daily bread will always be there for us. Let us remember that of all the gifts our Father gives, there is not one that we can give ourselves, no not one. Even the breath that sustains our lives is given by the Father and without it we cease to exist. Let us give thanks to the Father who created us in His image to love and glorify Him for His gracious gift of our daily bread.

Christ Care Ministry The Power of Presence

"Like one who takes away a garment on a cold day, or like vinegar poured on soda, is one who sings songs to a heavy heart." – Proverbs 25:20

Have you been there? Have you found yourself struggling for the right thing to say, eloquent words of comfort for that hurting soul who is standing in front of you with the silent pleading heart? You want to say something to comfort and then it comes out ... the wrong words ... "I know how you feel."

In his book, *Don't Sing Songs to A Heavy Heart*, Kenneth C. Haugk writes about the power of presence ... yes, your presence, but more than that, who is present in you as you stand in the threshold of some hurting soul's heart. He says, "Who you are is forever interwoven with what you do" or what capacity within which you act. You are a tool that God has prepared.

It's about the presence of Jesus. Over and over, research respondents reported *presence* alone as a powerful caring force. A woman who was 25 when her mother died said, "I don't remember anything they said, only their *presence* and prayers." Another said, "When people came and were just *present* for me, they were a gift. I felt love, compassion, and acceptance of the fact that I preferred silence over small talk. I was able to be lost in my own thoughts, yet not alone. They helped make a sad time a little more bearable."

Folks, when you don't know what to say, try saying ... nothing. Just let your quiet presence be the powerful witness to your love, that is, the love of Jesus in you. Henri J. M. Nouwen, author of *The Wounded Healer*, says it beautifully: "If there is any posture that disturbs a suffering man or woman, it is aloofness.

The tragedy of Christian ministry is that many who are in great need, many who seek an attentive ear, a word of support, a forgiving embrace, a firm hand, a tender smile, or even a stuttering confession of inability to do more, often find their ministers distant men who do not want to burn their fingers."

Your *presence* brings not only the gift of yourself into the relationship but also, in and through you, the gift of God – Your Jesus. And that, dear friends, is indeed powerful.

There are many kinds of sorrow on earth, but the deepest of all sorrows is when the heart loses Christ, and he is no longer seen, and there is no hope of comfort from him. Only a few are so sorely tempted. All comfort has gone, all joy is ended, there is no help from heaven or sun or moon, from angel or any creature. There is even no help from God. But the world rejoices.

Such joy Christ gives to the world and, on the other hand, deep sorrow to his Christians. At the same time, he paints the world as a place of horror and a child of the devil, for it has no greater joy than to see Christ perish and his Christians shamefully condemned and lost.

That is why Christ tells us. "You have heard both how the world will rejoice and how you will be sorrowful. Therefore, hear it and remember it so that when sorrows abound you may have patience and receive true comfort from such sufferings. I must tempt you thus and let you taste what it means to have lost your Savior and to have died in your hearts, so that you may be given a little knowledge of this mystery. Otherwise, you cannot be given knowledge of my nature. It is too high for you to properly understand, this lofty work, that the Son of God returns to his Father, that is, he dies for you and me and rises again, so that he may bring us likewise into heaven."


