Pastor's Pen Faith as the Bottom Line

"These were all commended for their faith, yet none of them received what had been promised." - Hebrews 11:39

The chapter in the book of Hebrews on "heroes of faith" is one of the best-known chapters of the New Testament. It is easy for me to read it and cheer at every line. Verses 29-35a give marvelous stories of how faith has won battles, ministered to kingdoms, resurrected the dead, and enabled daring escapes from almost certain death. This is the kind of faith that I like --- a faith that moves from victory to victory, a faith that Continued on page 2

brings favorable results. This kind of faith is perfect for the SportsCenter highlight films, where all we see are game-winning pitches and decisive home-run swings.

The writer of Hebrews paints a fuller canvas about the life of faith. It is possible to be living a faith-filled life and not have these results. Starting with verse 35b, we see people who in faith were flogged, stoned, sawed in two, and subjected to lives of destitution. These people would not compromise their faith in order to escape earthly difficulties. On this earth they did not live "happily ever after."

Hebrews presents an unflinching look at faith.

Sometimes faithful people suffer through the agony of a miscarriage. Faithful Christians lose jobs, get into car accidents, and struggle with debts. Our walk of faith is not always a simple equation of doing the right thing, and trusting in God, and always coming out on top. Jesus lived a perfect and holy life and died a hideous death on the cross. But God had something better planned for him in heaven. That's part of faith: being willing to wait for the unseen blessing that may elude us here on this earth. This "something better" far outweighs any temporal trophy. May God grant us the wisdom to accept both earthly success and earthly difficulty.

Prayer: Lord God, help us to understand that faith may bring many different types of results on this earth. Give us grace cheerfully to accept all of life's offerings. Amen

Worship Ministry Reconciliation with God

There is the need for you and me to be reconciled to God because there has been a broken or a breached friendship in the relationship between God and man. It was sin that made the breach, a violation between God and man. The relationship was now broken and with sin in our hearts, we were filled with enmity and hostility against God, having no use for Him and causing Him to be justly offended with us as sinners. God loves us regardless of our sinfulness. Reconciliation occurs only when enemies become friends.

As the things of the world constantly change, we are seduced and enticed with the visible and tangible things to satisfy our needs for contentment, sometimes making them gods and not realizing that they only satisfy for a moment. It is God alone who ultimately satisfies our greatest needs for all that we are and all that we need. The apostle John tells us, "For everything in the world, the cravings of sinful man, the lust of the eyes, the boasting of what he does—comes not from the Father, but from the world." What are we to do and how will we ever be reconciled to God with the many diversions confronting us? We are enabled by divine grace to live above the things of the world with Christ in our hearts and the world under our feet.

Consequently, how did we receive redemption and reconciliation? It was God who took the initiative in redemption and reconciliation. It is God that demonstrates his love for us in this: while we were still sinners Christ died for us. Peter tells us that in God's great mercy he has given us a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ. God appointed the Mediator of reconciliation and has reconciled us to Himself by Jesus Christ. Moreover, when we are reconciled to God, our sins are forgiven and He does not impute or hold us accountable and has entered a new covenant. He freely forgives us of all our sins and justifies us freely by His grace to all who believe in Him.

Christ Care Ministry Tears of Relief and Little Glimpses of Heaven

"Ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will opened to you. For everyone who asks receives, and the one who seeks finds, and to the one who knocks it will be opened."

- Matthew 7: 7-8.

Today in Europe, LCMS Missionaries are ministering to refugees who have been fleeing war-torn countries. Dr. Christian Tiews, LCMS Missionary to Germany, tells of one of his recent experiences. He met a Ukrainian mother and her teenage daughter at the train station in Hamburg. The husband/father had elected to stay behind to help defend the country. Tiews said he wasn't sure how to identify the woman, so he held up a homemade blue and yellow sign with their names.

"As the Lord would have it," Tiews, said, "they disembarked right in front of me ... with tears of relief running down their faces after five days on the road." Tiews said that he helped the women find their host and accompanied them to the host's vehicle.

"When we got there, I asked whether they would mind if we had a prayer of thanks for their safe arrival." Tiews said the German host looked skeptical, saying, "praying is not really my thing."

But the Ukranians agreed, and Tiews prayed with the group, noting that after the prayer, the Ukranians made the sign of the cross. The next day, Tiews said the women's host called to let him know they were doing well. Before hanging up, she added, "Thank you for praying last night. I'm not really into all that religion

stuff, but somehow praying to God felt good. It gave me peace."

And so, beloved, isn't it comforting to see how prayer (and proclamation) can be answered in so many positive ways. Comforting tears of relief and joy for refugees and a moment of God's peace for "a not so religious person." What a beautiful witness! God does indeed, give us little glimpses of heaven through prayer.

Prayer- Father, send to us Your Holy Spirit every day to help us to ask, seek and knock so that we may find comfort in knowing Your presence and that the door to heaven is always open to us. Amen.

IRS Warns of Communications Scams

The IRS has recently issued a series of notices called their "Dirty Dozen" scams warning list. Number 7 on the list is suspicious communications designed to trick, surprise or scare you into responding before thinking. IRS officials are warning everyone to be on the lookout for bogus calls, texts, emails and online posts used to gain trust or steal.

Criminals have been using these methods for years and they continue because their ploys have worked well. Victims are tricked into providing sensitive personal financial data, money, or other information.

"If you're surprised or scared by a call or text, it's likely a scam so proceed with extreme caution," says IRS Commissioner Chuck Rettig. He adds that you should be sure to verify a suspicious email or other communication independently of the message in question.



Painting the Planet Purple with Servanthood

1942 -2022 -- 80 YEARS of GOD'S GRACE

LWML History

Why Purple?

The official colors of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League are **PURPLE** and **GOLD**. According to the Southern Illinois *Lutheran Woman's Quarterly Supplement, October 1948*, the Southern Illinois district was the first to adopt the colors of **purple**, symbolizing royalty, and **gold**, symbolizing value and integrity.

The LWML Executive Board adopted purple and gold at their board meeting, held on July 24, 1951, at the Commodore Hotel New York, New York. The minutes of this meeting, state: "Motion was made by Mrs. Emil Frank to recommend that the colors of purple and gold as suggested in the Handbook, be adopted as the official League colors. Action – Adopted." This historical decision is noted on page 77 of *Wings (c 1991)*.
