Pastor's Pen Getting to Know God

"Do you not know? Have you not heard? The LORD is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth. He will not grow tired or weary, and his understanding, no one can fathom. (Isaiah 40:28 NIV)

Have you ever complained to God, either verbally or silently, and accused him of not taking care of you, and failing to notice the difficulties that surround your life? Leaders like Moses and Isaiah often heard their people's dissatisfaction with God. In verse 27, the prophet asks, "Why do you say ... and complain, 0 Israel, 'My way is hidden from the Lord; my cause is disregarded by my God?"

We shouldn't be too hard on the Israelites. At least they were being honest. They were away from the Promised Land in exile in Babylon. They were far away from the temple and the beauty of Mount Zion. In the stresses of exile and foreign captivity, they voiced their feelings regarding God. They complained that God had abandoned them. They felt that he did not know their plight and was unaware of their dire situation. Not too long ago, there was a project in which I was deeply involved. After a few years of fruitful work, it appeared that the work might be stopped and left unfinished. I felt that God had forgotten me and my plight. My complaints were deep and bitter. So were the people of Israel's!

It may surprise us to realize that when we complain about God's lack of care, the real dilemma lies in the fact that we really do not know the character of God. Isaiah is quick to point out both the ignorance and the short term memory of his people. In verse 28, he reminds us that our God is never plagued by fatigue or memory loss or confusion. Our God is never "asleep at the switch." He is never afflicted by indecision or caught unaware by troubling circumstances. These are very human shortcomings. But God's character is never reflected in human weaknesses.

Who does God help and strengthen? Does he come to the aid of the strong, the competent, the clever, the eloquent, or the self-reliant? Isaiah reminds us that those who know God's strength are the weary, the weak, the stumbling and those who are falling. God delights in equipping those who acknowledge their need and vulnerability and flaws. We should spend time with this passage and reflect on the God it reveals to us. When we are at the end of our abilities, we should resist the desire to complain that God's abilities are equally limited. Instead, our weakness is the entrance way to discovering a God who is ready and able and aware of our need. Indeed he delights in giving us the strength necessary to replace our pint-size efforts.

Dear God, free us from accusing you of abandoning us and not caring. Help us to know and trust you, so that our lives might bear testimony to your strength and constant care. Amen.

From the President Pastoral Call Update

The Call Committee tasked to find our next pastor was formed in December 2021 and consists of five members -Frances Foy, Wendy Harris, Henry Mosley, Robert Regulus, and Glen Thompson - as well as Interim Pastor Kurtis Schultz and Circuit Counselor Pastor Tom Noon. The committee has received two call lists from the Southern District President Pastor Eric Johnson which consisted of 12 candidates. The committee has also reviewed two additional candidates in the field and reviewed two seminary candidates from the Fort Wayne seminary. Over the past almost 15 months, the committee has interviewed 13 candidates and issued 3 calls. To date one called candidate has visited the congregation and all three of our calls have been returned to us unanswered.

The Call Committee has not been discouraged by the process that we have gone through. God has used this time to prepare the congregation for the pastor he has chosen for us. It has been a time for us to listen to the concerns and perspectives of the pastors that we have interviewed and to reflect on changes that we as a congregation needed to make. The congregation has implemented improvements in our fiscal plan that show that we have a long-term plan and people have demonstrated their commitment to the ministry by participating in projects and Bible study.

On February 19 the Voters Assembly extended a call to Pastor Wayne Miller at Grace Lutheran Church in Mobile, Alabama. In April 2022, First Lutheran issued a call to Pastor Miller but that call was returned to us. At the time, Pastor Miller felt that the Lord wanted him to stay in his current ministry. The Call Committee has always felt that Pastor Miller was a good match for our congregation and the committee struggled with the question of whether or not we should recommend to the congregation that another call be issued to Pastor Miller. In early February, the committee felt that God was leading us back to Pastor Miller and that we should issue a call to him. Please pray for Pastor Miller as he considers our second call to him and ask that the Lord would direct his decision and continue to use him to the best of his talents. Since we are in the Lenten season, we do not expect to hear from Pastor Miller until after Easter.

We are looking forward to hearing from Pastor Miller and pray he is the one chosen by God to be our shepherd.

Week 1 • Isaiah of Babylon (Isaiah 6:7): We see God's amazing grace at work in the life of the prophet Isaiah,


who proclaimed to God's people the salvation that was to come through the Suffering Servant.

Worship Ministry Children of God - Loved by the Father (1 John 3:1-3)

There have been many great loves, both Biblical and those written by the great authors of our time. We stand before God acceptable to Him through His Son our Savior. However, there are times when we recognize our sinfulness and wonder how God can let you and me into heaven. We must look beyond our feelings and reasons and by faith lay hold to the promises of God. It is not how we feel about God that gives comfort; it is the fact that God loves us that gives us hope. The question is, can you and I wait on the Lord for the fulfillment of His promises as Children of God – beloved by the Father?

Christ Care Ministry Worry

Jesus said, "Therefore, I tell you, do not be anxious about your life . . . Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds of the air: they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. And which of you by being anxious can add a single hour to the span of your life? And why are you anxious about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field how they grow; they neither toil nor spin. Yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. . . Therefore, do not be anxious. . . But seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be yours as well."

- Matthew 6:25-33

God is in the details. His providence is perfect. Nothing is beyond His care. Nothing is beyond His power. Consider: At the equator, the earth is spinning at 1,037 miles per hour. The earth's orbital speed around the sun is almost 67,000 miles per hour. The earth travels about 1.6 million miles per day. The sun has an orbit of its own in the Milky Way. The sun is about 25,000 light-years from the center of the galaxy, and the Milky Way is at least 100,000 light-years across. The sun and the solar system appear to be moving at a speed of 448,000 miles per hour. And yet we do not feel the movement of the earth, nor do the planets and stars sweep in a blur when we look up. God has perfectly ordered the vastness of what He has created. Indeed, "The heavens declare the glory of God, and the firmament showeth His handiwork" (Psalm 19:1). Since God has put in its place all that is seen and unseen, does He not also

look with infinite care upon the minutes of our days, our "going out and coming in?" Of course He does. That is why on not a few occasions, Jesus said: "Do not be anxious. Do not worry. Do not be afraid." Yes, there are diseases and evil in the world and many mysteries about life, but God is infinite in power and love. He brings good out of evil and offers solace to the grieving. With loving-kindness He disciplines His children; He teaches them what is right and what is wrong, what enhances life and what diminishes life. He has cleansed our sins through the Blood of His Son, and has transformed our former selves into new creations, destined to be with Him forever. He commands us not to worry, not to be anxious, not to be fearful, but to trust in His love and power, and to walk in His paths of goodness and peace: all of this out of love for us. Why then should we be fearful? Why should we worry? Look up into the heavens. Consider the glory of the night sky. Look at the Cross. Remember His love.




