Pastor's Pen Great is His Faithfulness

"... for his steadfast love endures forever!" - Psalm 106:1b

In the month of October, we celebrate the Reformation. Many have often wondered what enabled Dr. Martin Luther to be the driving force he came to be, during the Reformation. The answer can be found in our verse this month. Dr. Luther knew the security of God's love. Sharing in that security of God's love is the heart of our heritage of faith. It is firm and sure, an immovable rock on which to build, and an anchor to cling to in stormy seas. Vastly different from human love, it is not based on chemistry, feelings,

like-mindedness, or performance. We can trust in his love no matter what we do or what happens to us. He simply but profoundly loves us.

God's faithfulness is not measured by the instability and fickleness of man's soul. God's love is based on his nature, and on his faithfulness to himself. In his love, he made a unilateral, unbreakable covenant with his people, no matter what they say or how they act. There are consequences for their choices, but he does not stop loving them, nor does he renege on the covenant. God has a plan to bless and fulfill all of his people. He is faithful to that plan, whether or not individuals refuse or reject His desired blessing for them.

At the foot of Mount Sinai, the people of Israel quickly turned aside from the way of Yahweh, created other gods, and spent their time eating, drinking, and playing. When in his wrath God turned away from them, Moses appealed to him, "Remember Abraham, Isaac, and Israel, thy servants, to whom thou didst swear by thine own self" (Exodus 32:13). Psalm 106 recounts Israel's rebellion, murmuring, provoking, and serving idols. Consequences were inevitable, but God never left them.

God continued with his perfect plan to save and bless his people. It is by his steadfast love that we are saved. Thanks be to God!

Prayer: We rejoice, Father, in your faithfulness and steadfast love for us. Help us to grow in that love, that we may reflect it to a troubled and unstable world. Amen.

Called to Serve and Celebrate Ministry

There is a story about a prosperous farmer who was visited by his pastor one day. The pastor pointed out to him that the Lord had given him a fertile piece of land and had blessed him with sunshine and rain so that his crops would grow. The farmer replied, "I don't mean to complain, Reverend, but you should have seen what a mess this place was when the Lord was running it by himself!"

There is a natural sense of pride we feel when we have accomplished something and that makes us reluctant to share the credit, even with God. Without God's grace, blessings, and mercy, we literally could not exist. God is, the King of our world.

King David's attitude about his own status before God stands out in stark contrast. In his final days, as he prepared to turn the throne of Israel over to his son, Solomon. David also laid the groundwork so that Solomon could build the Temple in Jerusalem. He had all of the materials needed to do the job gathered. He contracted with skilled craftsmen to serve his son. And he donated not only income from the royal treasury, but also huge sums from his personal fortunes toward the project. David then prayed a prayer that has to be considered remarkable for a king in that age. The whole prayer is recorded in I Chronicles 29:10–19 but consider the implications of just two verses.

First of all, David ascribed to God the attributes that were normally used to speak of a king. He said, "Thine, O Lord, is the greatness, and the power, and the glory, and victory, and the majesty; for all that is in the heavens and in the earth is thine; thine is the kingdom, O Lord, and thou are exalted as head above all." (v.11) There were not many kings who would say that their kingdom really belonged to someone else. The second remarkable thing was that David acknowledged that ultimately, the people had God and not the king to thank for everything they had. He said, "But who am I, and what are my people, that we should be able thus to offer willingly? For all things come from thee, and of thy own have we given thee" (v.14).

As we think about things that we label as our own, it is always helpful to recognize that whatever we have is really on loan to us from God. That is the real meaning of stewardship. It is vitally important that each of us view stewardship as the Christian way of life and not just a plea for our money. Stewardship is a lifelong struggle on our part to overcome our tendency to get and to keep and to develop our God-given potential to care and share. But even more, it is our humble acknowledgment that all good things come from God. With David we pray, "But who are we that we should be able to offer willingly? For all things come from thee, and of thy own have we given thee."

Deacons' Corner Grace Without Christ

Cheap grace is the grace we bestow on ourselves. Cheap grace is the preaching of forgiveness without requiring repentance, baptism without church discipline, Communion without confession, absolution without personal confession. Cheap grace is grace without discipleship, grace without the cross, grace without Jesus Christ, living and incarnate.

Costly grace is the treasure hidden in the field; for the sake of it a man will gladly go and sell all that he has. It is the pearl of great price to buy which the merchant will sell all his goods. It is the kingly rule of Christ, for whose sake a man will pluck out the eye that causes him to stumble, it is the call of Jesus Christ at which the disciple leaves his nets and follows him.

Costly grace is the gospel which must be *sought* again and again, the gift which must be *asked* for, the door at which a man must *knock*.

Such grace is *costly* because it calls us to follow, and it is *grace* because it calls us to follow *Jesus Christ*. It is costly because it gives a man the only true life. It is costly because it condemns sin, and grace because it justifies the sinner. Above all, it is *costly* because it cost God the life of his Son: "You were bought at a price" (I Corinthians 7:23), and what has cost God much cannot be cheap for us. Above all, it is *grace* because God did not reckon his Son too dear a price to pay for our life but delivered him up for us. Costly grace is the Incarnation of God.

"Encourage one another and build each other up, just as you are doing." (1 Thessalonians 5:12) "Oil and perfume make the heart glad, and the sweetness of friends comes from their earnest counsel." (Proverbs 27:9) "Love one another with affection. Outdo one another in showing honor." (Romans 12:10) "Now when Job's three friends learned of all the troubles that had come upon him, each of them - Eliphaz, Bildad, and Zophar - set out from their home. They met together to go and console him. When they saw Job at a distance, they did not recognize him, and when they did recognize him, they wept aloud. . . They sat with him on the ground for seven days and seven nights, and no one said a word, for they saw that his suffering was very great." (Job 2: 11-13) "Love is patient. Love is kind. Love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. Love does not insist on its own way. It is not irritable or resentful. . . Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things." (1 Corinthians 13: 4-7).

Next to God and family, our friends - true, trusting, loving friends - give us joy, contentment, peace, and comfort. Such friendships do not "just happen," though quick may have been the connection upon first meeting. Lasting friendships are formed when there is mutual enjoyment in each other's company, when there's mutual respect, mutual interests, common values, and a shared faith in the goodness and providence of God. Acquaintances are many, but true friends are made only over time and with openness of heart and trust of mind and spirit. Friendships flourish when there are leisurely hours spent together. Those hours will form such a strong bond that many years may pass before friends see each other again, and yet when they do see each other, it's as though only several weeks have passed. The most precious gift anyone has to give is twofold: *time* and *love*. From our Creator Father we have received such a gift: we have received this life, and through the merits of Jesus, the promise of eternal life. And all because of God's unconditional love for us. PRAISE GOD!
