Yet, even things apparently undesirable or evil can be made occasions for thanksgiving to God, since he never fails to extract from even the most unpromising situation some element which can be turned to our good.

We give thanks to God for his many blessings, and not the least for the opportunities he has given us of learning patience and forbearance through our adversities, and learning to know ourselves better; of learning, perhaps even in failure or neglect, that the only ultimate value in our lives is the love he has for us.

Thanksgiving Day offers us an opportunity to stop and express our appreciation for the preciousness of life, the goodness of life, the bounty given to us by God "Good measure: pressed down, running over."

From the President

We will soon begin our third year in the call process. Thus far we have had four call lists provided to us by President Johnson and have had two seminary students recommended to us by Concordia Theological Seminary in Fort Wayne Indiana. In total, the Call Committee has reviewed 23 candidates, interviewed 16 candidates, and have recommended six pastors to the congregation for a call. Six calls have been issued by the congregation. Two of these pastors have visited the church, but unfortunately all six of the calls have been declined.

In early October, the Call Committee met to discuss our plans for moving forward. Pastor Schultz shared some information concerning the number of LCMS congregations and the pastors serving these congregations. Currently there are 6,000 LCMS congregations with approximately 12% (720) having a pastoral vacancy. There are 9,494 rostered pastors in the LCMS. On the surface this looks like a good ratio of pastors to churches until you look at the age distribution of the pastors. 4,176 of these pastors are over age 65 (44%). The other 56% of the pastors are broken down as follows: 60 to 65 – 516 (5%), 50 to 60 – 1282 (13.5%), 40 to 50 – 1045 (11%), 30 to 40 – 755 (8%), and 20 to 30 – 124 (1%).

The Call Committee has focused primarily on pastors with five to seven years of experience when considering a pastor for a call. We have done this based on the current giving of the congregation since the salary associated with this experience level more closely reflects what the congregation can support. The committee has asked Pastor Schultz to contact the two seminaries and see if there are candidates in the 2024 class that might match well with our congregation. We hope that they will respond by the end of November. If candidates are identified, we will review and if felt to be a good match for the congregation, we will interview. If no candidates are identified in the seminaries, then we will request another call list from President Johnson. We would hopefully get a list by the first of the year. Either way, it appears that the earliest we can call another pastor is spring of 2024.

The Call Committee had hoped that we would have a new pastor by now and we are assured that God has chosen a man to be our new shepherd. It appears that God is not finished preparing this man for us, but we look forward to the day He provides him to us. We continue to be thankful for the retired pastors that God has provided to us as He continues preparing the one He has selected for us.

Deacons' Corner Extreme Makeover

*“Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation, the old has gone, the new has come.”
- 2 Corinthians 5:17*

Many things have changed in the world since our Lord created our foreparents Adam and Eve. We live in a world where things and man are constantly being changed. We are transforming ourselves as well as our attitudes into whatever fashion or form that we think right or desire. However, there are some things that have remained constant throughout the ages, and that is Our Lord's Word, His love, His forgiveness and compassion, His promises and patience with us through His Son. We were buried with Him in baptism into death in order that just as Christ was raised from the dead, through the glory of the Father, we may live a new life.

Consequently, the capacity to see both our fellow man and Christ in their light, comes from this inner transformation achieved by being in Christ. This phase describes a mystical experience in which we live because Christ lives in us. “A man in Christ” is Paul's definition for a Christian. It implies an inner change which is equivalent to a new creation. A person in Christ is not merely improved or reformed, which implies no more than an external change, he is remade. He is different from what he was at his best. The old may refer to the desires and purposes of a self-centered life, the new the purposes of a Christ-centered life. The essential difference is an inner change wherein his thoughts and ambitions are no longer focused on himself but on Christ and the interest of others. The old has passed away ...The new has come.

There is a transformation of values. Hardship, suffering, disappointment, and misfortune have become the means of God's challenge, or of His discipline, like the tools of the potter which gives the cup its shape, both for use and to serve. As Jeremiah says, sometime the pot is marred in the potter's hand. Sometimes the pot does not do what it was designed to do. But the potter takes and breaks it and molds and makes it what he would have it be. Aren't we glad to know that when we are marred and broken, the Lord is not through with us yet? We should want him to re-create us. When we are in God's hand, we can then receive an extreme **“Makeover.”**

You are Mine

But now thus says the Lord. He who created you, O Jacob, He who formed you, O Israel: “Fear not, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine. When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you. For I am the LORD your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Savior.

- Isaiah 43:1-3a

“Fear not.” This seems like an unreasonable request from God. To stand in the presence of our Creator and Judge as a broken and sinful creature should invoke the greatest of fear and shame.

Even so, the Lord does speak to us and His first words are not judgment but absolution and comfort: “*Fear not.*” Jesus spoke these words to Peter when he was terrified, as a sinful man, to be in Jesus’ presence. We cannot stand before God because of our own merits and deeds. Although we are sinful and unclean, we can stand without fear before God because He has redeemed us through Christ. He calls us to Himself by name, and our name is “*You are Mine.*”

We are first called by name in the waters of Holy Baptism. This washing of regeneration and renewal of the Holy Spirit offers forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation. God does not forget the promise He made to us in our Baptism.

We were buried into Christ’s death in our Baptism, but we were also raised to a new life in Him. This new life is not without hurt, trial, or temptation. In fact, our new life is beset with them, and the old fear creeps in on us. But the new promise of God is not for only one day. He guides us waking and guards us sleeping every day. Even when we are most vulnerable and unable to act. He does not leave us or forsake us. Anxious thoughts and the troubles of the world threaten to overwhelm us, but they cannot! It is not our own strength that quenches the fiery arrows of the devil. **It is the promise of the presence of God, who on the cross defeated the devil.** Our own strength will fail, but He never will. God is with us.

Prayer

Heavenly Father, You have redeemed us with the holy precious blood of your Son. You have reconciled us to You in the waters of Holy Baptism. Guide and keep us in our lives as we meet trial and temptation. Strengthen our faith, that we may be ever mindful that You have called us by name and that we are Yours, through Your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.


