Pastor's Pen Doubt

Since Genesis 3, doubt has constantly assailed God's people whispering to them the same question the serpent asked so long ago. "Did God really say?" This question is the catalyst for unbelief and all the accompanying emotions. Anger and resentment, sorrow and despair, confusion, and rejection all stem from the question the serpent asked Eve. Did God really say that He would protect you? Did God really say that He would provide for you? Did God really say that He saved you from your sins? Did God really say that those things are even sins at all? Even though throughout time the question has been



dressed up in different ways by the devil, false prophets, and unbelievers the core premise remains the same. You should question God's Word.

For the Christian, it is quite taboo to talk about doubt. There seems to be air of great fear and disgust when someone brings up questions of doubt or worry they may have. It is as if someone's doubt automatically means that they must not be saved or on the brink of betraying their faith in Christ so they must be excised from the Church in order to not pollute the rest. Brothers and sisters, it should not be this way. While, yes, doubt is a problem to be taken seriously, it should not be met with the hammer of the Law or a prideful superiority complex. Instead, listen to the word of St. Jude, "And have mercy on those who doubt; save others by snatching them out of the fire; to other show mercy with fear, hating even the garment stained by the flesh." Since doubt and unbelief have been with us from the beginning, we should not shy away from speaking about it. Questions should not be treated as unmentionable or prohibited but instead addressed and talked through drawing people back to God's Word. Think about it. How many times does God repeat Himself through the Scriptures? How often does He reassure us, prophecy to us, comfort us, warn us, and guide us? If the Lord must repeat Himself, how much more will we have to do this for one another?

Listen again to the word of St. Jude, "But you must remember, beloved, the predictions of the apostles of our Lord Jesus Christ. They said to you, 'In the last time there will be scoffers, following their own ungodly passions." Dear Christian, hear the counsel of St. Jude. Christ and His apostles, the Old Testament Prophets, the martyrs, and saints of our age all remind us of the suffering that we will endure. We live in a fallen world with fallen people. Tragedies both caused by man and caused by nature will befall us and all people. I know it is difficult to look at those and believe in a loving God. However, I implore you to seek counsel where the Lord says it may be found. Namely, His holy Word. He has spoken about these things, the struggles and sufferings of His people, the terrible pain sin causes us, the horrible burden that we must bear sometimes and He does not dismiss those concerns. Instead, Christ points us to the resurrection. Points us to the time where all things will be made right. In mercy, the Lord waits to return so that all may hear the Gospel, and I know the wait is hard. Yet, there is a time that is coming when suffering will cease. Not only that, but God Himself will be the one to wipe away every tear from our eyes and bring us into eternal glory. Cling to this promise. Not only for your sake, but for the sake of your loved ones. For it is not just your tears that will be wiped away, but every tear of your friends and family. As we wait, let us then continue to build one another up and deal with each other in mercy.

From Our Congregational President

The Lenten Season begins on March 5 and goes on to April 20 with the celebration of Easter. Each Wednesday evening there will be a midweek Vespers Service at 6:00 PM. On Ash Wednesday the imposition of ashes will precede the service. The Wednesdays from March 12 through April 9, a meal will be provided at 5:15 PM. Different organizations and individuals in the church will host the meals (3/12-LWML, 3/19-Lorenza Robinson, 3/26-Christy Hubbard, 4/2-Stan and June Weir, and 4/9-Deacons). I encourage everyone to attend and enjoy the food and fellowship. You are also encouraged to invite friends and relatives to share the season with us. If you would like to help with a meal, contact the sponsoring group or family to volunteer. During Holy Week we will not have a Wednesday evening service but will celebrate Maundy Thursday on April 17, Tenebrae on Good Friday April 18, Easter Vigil on Saturday April 19, and Easter Sunday on April 20.

This year we are adding the Easter Vigil service to Holy Week. The vigil service is a time "to keep watch." It is a time set aside for attentive waiting and prayer. It is a service that has appointed readings which are full of contrasts: light and dark, good and evil, punishment and mercy. They tell stories of the Lord's salvation for His people in the past and point ahead to what Jesus has done for us and all the world now in his death and resurrection. The Easter Vigil service acts as a bridge between the reflective season of Lent and the joyful season of Easter, connecting Good Friday to Easter Sunday. The services on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday will begin at 6:00 PM. The Easter Vigil service will be around 2 hours long.

Recently the Church Council was asked to approve the dispersal of cremated remains of a prior member on the church's property. After thoughtful study and discussion, the Council approved a policy of allowing the wide distribution of cremated remains of a member or former member of the church. The Council approved the hillside beside the church as the designated area for the distribution. The pastor is to be consulted and an appropriate committal service should be held prior to or during the distribution. No cremated remains will be accepted by the church or maintained on the property other than through a dispersal committal.





Stewardship

God has given each of us time, talents, and treasures. May we use them to HIS glory.

March is a month with a few significant dates. Ash Wednesday is the 5th; the Ides of March is the 15th; St Patrick's Day is the 17th and the first day of spring is the 20th.

Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent, a 40-day period of fasting and prayer before the celebration of Easter. This year it falls on March 5.

The Ides of March is the day that Julius Caesar was assassinated in 44 BC. Mark 12:17 reads, "So Jesus said, "Give back to Caesar what is Caesar's, to God what belongs to God." Wow! That one Bible verse sums up Stewardship!

On the 17th we recall the life of St. Patrick. He was a missionary and bishop in Ireland in the 5th century. He is considered the patron saint of Ireland and is credited with spreading Christianity throughout the region. He was born in Britian, and his birth name was Maewyn Succat. After a six-year enslavement, which he called, "God's test of faith," where he was in constant prayer, he became a Christian figure in the Catholic faith. St. Patrick died in 461 A.D. on March 17th which is referred to as his "Feast Day". This day is celebrated annually throughout the Christian world.

The first day of spring is centered around the spring equinox. This is the exact moment when the earth's axis and its orbit line up so that both the northern and southern hemispheres get an equal amount of sunlight. Ecclesiastes 3:2, reads, there "is a time for planting". We plant our flowers and vegetables in the spring. Psalm 1:1-3 (paraphrased), Happy are those who obey God's laws. They will grow like a tree along the streams of water. They succeed in everything they do.

We prepare to celebrate Jesus' gift of forgiveness and eternal life during Easter. What a glorious thought to be thanking God for the gift of His Son.
