From Our Congregational President

The Southern District had its' triennium convention in March in Slidell, LA. During the convention, the Synod President and the District President gave reports on the state of the church. Elections for district offices were held and Stan Weir from our congregation was elected as a member-at-large for the District Board of Directors. Additionally, there were sessions involving mission outreach, church growth, and programs offered by recognized service organizations (RSO's) in the greater church organization.

I had the privilege of attending the synod convention held in July 2024 in Milwaukee, WI and the district convention held in March 2025 in Slidell, LA. This was the first time I had attended either convention and I found them both to be very interesting.

As you are aware, there are few Lutheran churches in the South and little fellowship occurs between the churches. From attending the conventions, I found there are opportunities available to us that we can utilize. Below I have highlighted a limited number of opportunities you may want to explore and potentially participate in.

- 1. The Southern District has a goal of training 500 lay missionaries. The district has an initiative to train 500 people to share the gospel through an online training program at no cost to the participant. This is not a church growth program but a share the gospel program to bring more people to Christ. If you are interested visit the Southern District website at www.southernlcms.org and review The Missionary Pathway.
- 2. Lutheran Early Response Team (LERT) This is an organization lead by Pastor Paul Ernewein in the Southern District that responds to natural disasters throughout the country. It is part of the larger LCMS Disaster Response program. Training is provided to equip volunteers in their desired role. Some roles include cooking, tree cutting, skilled trades (carpentry, electrical, plumbing), spiritual care, damage assessment, shelter management, volunteer coordination, and medical services. Basic LERT classes and chainsaw operation classes have been scheduled for May and June in the district. Grace Lutheran in Huntsville is hosting basic training on May 9 and chainsaw operation on May 10. The Southern District office in Slidell, LA will have a basic class on May 3 and a chainsaw class on May 16 and 17. See me if you would like to attend.

- 3. Lutheran Church Charities (LCC) LCC exists as a partner and resource to individual LCMS churches to share the mercy, compassion, presence, and proclamation of Jesus Christ. LCC can help garner resources to provide care for individuals or families by working through the local church. They can equip a church to develop a Care Team and expand the church's reach through community engagement. For more information visit their website www.lutheranchurchcharities.org.
- 4. Southern District Church Extension Fund (SDCEF) and Legacy Deo The SDCEF provides affordable loans to LCMS congregations for new facilities, additions, professional worker primary residence, and capitol improvements. In addition, on the investor side, it provides CDs at a competitive interest rate. The fund also has demand accounts and save by mail accounts. For more information see their website at www.southerncef.org.

Legacy Deo is an organization founded by the Texas District LCMS that is dedicated to managing charitable gifts to provide a perpetual base of funding for various ministries. They accept cash and non-cash gifts which they convert to cash for a ministry. In 2024, an anonymous donor of First Lutheran established an account for the church with a \$10,000 donation. Anyone can make additional contributions to this account. When the account reaches a minimum of \$100,000, the church will start receiving 4% of the endowment's assets annually. This money would go back into the treasury to support the church's ministry. Please consider making memorial, estate, or other gifts to this fund. Deposits can be made by designating a gift and placing it in with your weekly offering or directly by going to Legacy Deo's website www.legacydeo.org/give/donate.

I hope you will consider some of these ways to participate in the broader church.



Mother's Day is May 11, 2025, this year. Traditionally, it is the second Sunday in May.

It began in the early 20th century here in the U.S. by the efforts of Anna Jarvis. Anna wanted to recognize her mother, Ann Reeves Jarvis, after her death so she campaigned for a national holiday to honor mothers. During her life, Anna's mother organized "Mother's Day Work Clubs" to improve sanitation and public health. Later she worked on "Mother's Friendship Day" to promote reconciliation after the Civil War. President Woodrow Wilson officially recognized Mother's Day in 1914. He signed a bill at Andrews Methodist Episcopal Church.

Today we recognize Mother's Day with greeting cards and flowers and special gratitude for our own mothers. This makes the holiday very special, as not every woman is a mother, but most everyone has or has had a mother or mother figure in their lives. If our mother has passed away and is now in heaven, she is remembered and honored on this day. If she is living, we call her, visit, give her cards, flowers, and most importantly, hugs, kisses, and words of thankfulness.

Let us remember to use our Stewardship gifts of "Time, Talents and Treasures" wisely. The Bible tells us to love our mothers. The fourth commandment says, "Honor your father and mother." Our Lord loved His mother, Mary. He provided her security and love when He told her at "The Cross", that John was her son and told John that Mary was his mother. (John 19: 26-27). We each have a story about our mother. Share your story with others. My mother was German and was the youngest of ten children. She was strict! She needed a good reason to smile or laugh. She told you the truth, even if it hurt! She was also kind, supportive, and generous. I remember her giving food to poor people. She would take hot coffee to the farm workers in the field. She taught Sunday School and was a Girl Scout Leader. She attended our school music concerts and sports events. We never missed church or Sunday School, unless we were *very* sick!

Whether your mother (or surrogate mother) is living or has passed away, we remember her with thanksgiving, especially on May 11. Our actions are a witness to others. We are evangelists and are sharing the Gospel, the good news of Jesus' love for each of us.

Our library is now open anytime the building is open. Books are available for "self-checkout," just follow the instructions on the desk. There is a generous 3 weeks for taking a book out of the library and a convenient return box in the hallway next to the library.

Donations to the Library are welcomed! Our goal is to expand the children's reading section for young children and teens. If you have books to donate, these must meet the library's criteria. Please check with Carol Melton or June Weir if you have donations. The Library Selection Policy will provide our guidelines.

Selection Policy:

The Library Committee firmly believes that an attractive church Library will attract users. The condition of library materials remains a constant focus. New, current materials will be added as funds allow based on the Selection Policy stated here. Current useful and desirable secular classics may be retained if in good shape, and still in popular demand, but monetary resources will be spent primarily on Christian materials. The library will not try to duplicate public library resources since our area has an abundance of public libraries from which to select secular materials. The Children's Collection will emphasize materials with a Christian family emphasis.

Christian bookstores and religious sections of other bookstores – Every effort will be made to purchase items which fit into the theology and spiritual goals of the Christian faith, and Lutheran theology when using non-denominational bookstores. Pastor will be called upon when titles are in question.

Recommendations from members are welcomed. We will evaluate and purchase the requested item if the material meets a need at the time of request; funds are available, and/or fit into the mission of the library under the selection policy.
